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Scholarships for Adults

While learning is undoubtedly a lifelong process, adults who wish to return to college face several obstacles when it comes to financing their education.

- The majority of scholarship opportunities are designated specifically for graduating high school seniors.
- Awards intended for incoming college freshmen often exclude adults who transfer credits from a community college.
- A large number of scholarships require a student to be enrolled full-time, while many adults attend classes on a parttime basis.
- Since most adult students work full-time and have their own assets, they are often disqualified from need-based scholarships and expected to rely on student loans or their own savings to pay for college tuition expenses.

However, this does not mean it is pointless for the adult student to search for scholarship opportunities. It simply suggests that more effort is necessary to achieve the desired result. Adult students need to search for scholarships from employers, professional associations, and national organizations, as well as awards sponsored by the college or university they wish to attend. Visit <u>College Scholarship</u> and review need-based scholarships as well as scholarships that are provided for <u>student-specific</u> audiences from adult, married, military to vegan.

Paying for College as an Adult

Students and their families are expected to contribute to the cost of college to the extent that they're able. Use the <u>Expected Family Contribution (EFC) Calculator</u> to estimate how much your family will be expected to contribute. After all, you can't make a realistic plan to cover your share if you don't have an idea what your share could be. That's how the financial aid system works. The difference between the total cost and your EFC is considered your "financial need" and the amount of aid you're eligible to receive.

Learn more about your financial aid eligibility. If you're unable to contribute the entire cost of college, financial aid may be available to bridge the gap. Visit the financial aid office to discuss your options.

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Academic Planning

Pre-Registration for Spring 2010

Beginning Sunday, November 8, 2009 at 10:00pm through November 20, 2009, undergraduate students will be able to pre-register in the order of highest to lowest degree credits earned to date (which does not include credits that students are enrolled in during the current Fall 2009 semester).

Registering in advance is an important part of proactive academic planning for all students, especially UCC affiliates. As continuing students, you are expected to register in advance to ensure you get the courses you need at times and locations suitable to you.

Pre-registration is offered in order to give you an opportunity to schedule courses prior to new students.

By registering early you allow departments to gauge the demand for courses, which in turn could impact the addition of more sections and allow UCC to promote the opening of more courses.

Major/Minor Fair Awareness

Policy Awareness

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Taking a leave of absence from school requires much thought on how it may impact your return, your finances, and your goal of attaining a degree. Speak to your advisor to ensure that you are aware of financial aid requirements and limitations before you postpone your academic plans.

Choosing a Schedule

Adults and working professionals encounter many challenges when registering for courses. Ideally, courses are chosen to fit academic requirements, but in many cases adults make course choices based on circumstances impacting their work schedule, family schedules, parking permit location, and on the availability of courses.

Do you consider final exam schedules when choosing courses? Students are encouraged to view the on-line final exam look-up or click on "Exams" to see exam grids, exam look-up, and common hour exams.
